

A True Baseball Icon Meet Roger Owens, the 'Peanut Man' of Dodgers Stadium

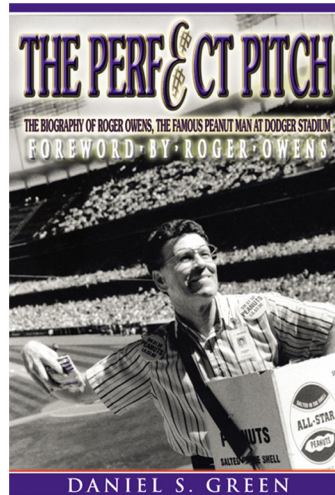
Interview the only “pitcher” in major league baseball who doesn’t make a million dollars a year. **Roger Owens** has made his job — pitching peanuts — a true art form.
